



Prairie Point Table Runner

MATERIALS:

[1] AMOSH panel
5/8 yard Missouri Words
5/8 yard Hexagonal Tonal Golden Yellow
1/3 yard Floral Trellis
1/3 yard Flowers & Bees
1/3 yard Ferns Yellow
1-1/2 yards, Backing
Batting

BEFORE SEWING, READ ALL INSTRUCTIONS.
ALL SEAMS ARE 1/4" UNLESS OTHERWISE
STATED. CUTTING INSTRUCTIONS ARE BASED
ON 40" WOF. WOF = WIDTH OF FABRIC;
RST = RIGHT SIDES TOGETHER

CUTTING:

From AMOSH Panel:

Fussy cut [4] — 11" square, leaving approximately 1/4" from edge of the colored border of the block.



From Hexagonal Tonal Golden Yellow Fabric:

Cut [6] — 1-1/2" × WOF strips

Subcut [8] — 1-1/2" × 11" rectangles

Subcut [8] — 1-1/2" × 13" rectangles

Cut [2] — 5" × WOF strips

Subcut [10] — 5" squares

From Missouri Words Fabric:

Cut [5] — 2-1/2" × WOF strips. Set [3] strips aside

Subcut [5] — 2-1/2" × 13" rectangles

Cut [2] — 5" × WOF strips

Subcut [10] — 5" squares

From each Floral Trellis, Flowers & Bees and Ferns Yellow Fabric:

Cut [2] — 5" × WOF strips

Subcut [10] — 5" squares

NOTE: You'll need approximately [45] — 5" squares depending on how they are spaced apart.

BLOCK ASSEMBLY:

1. To the top and bottom of Panel square, stitch a Hexagonal Tonal Golden Yellow 1-1/2" × 11" rectangle. Press and trim.
2. To each side of the block, sew a Hexagonal Tonal Golden Yellow 1-1/2" × 13" rectangle. Press and trim.

RUNNER ASSEMBLY:

Sashing and Borders - Buckeye Print

1. Sew the [4] units together with a 2-1/2" × 13" strip of Missouri Words between each and [1] on each end. Press and trim.
2. Take [1] of the reserved 2-1/2" × WOF strips and cut it in half. Sew each half strip to [1] of the long strips; yielding [2] strips approximately 60" long.
3. Sew the long border strips to long side of the table runner. Press & trim.

Prairie Points

1. Placing wrong sides together, fold [1] square diagonally from corner to corner to form a triangle. Fold the square again along its longest edge, taking care to align the edges together. Pressing with steam helps to keep the folds intact. Repeat with remaining squares.



2. With RST, evenly space the prairie points along the edges of the table runner, pinning as you go. Use a ruler to line up all the sides. When you're satisfied with the placement of all the triangles, stitch 1/4" around the table runner, starting at the top and sewing towards the tucked in point.



NOTE: This type of prairie point produces a finished triangle with an open edge on one side, enabling you to tuck one point inside the other as they are placed along the edges of the table runner.

Make certain the open ends of the triangles are all going the same way. Use a ruler to space the triangles evenly. (You may have some prairie points leftover depending on how far apart they're spaced.)

RUNNER ASSEMBLY:

1. At one of the short ends, measure approximately 5" from each edge and mark. This is the opening needed to flip the table runner right side out.
2. Place the batting on the table. Place the backing fabric, right side facing up, on top of the batting.
3. Next with RST, place the top section on the backing fabric with the prairie points inside and the raw edges facing out. The batting will be on the bottom at this point.

PRAIRIE POINT RAW EDGES FACING OUT

4. Begin stitching at the second 5" mark. Be sure to back stitch, as this will make the seam more secure when it comes time to flip the table runner right side out. Continue to stitch around the entire table runner until you reach the other 5" mark.

NOTE: You will be stitching over the same stitches that were used to secure the prairie points.

5. Press to set seams. Trim corners, if necessary, to remove bulk. Turn table runner right side out. Press the prairie points outward.
6. Fold the opening fabric in 1/4" and press. Whip stitch opening closed.

FINISHING:

1. Stitch in the ditch around each block to secure the batting. Or, use your favorite quilting design or technique to finish.
